Two adult chaperones required per group of 10 remain with each group at all times. Chaperones are sometimes asked to participate in activities and should be willing to do so.

Fee for Spring Field Day is \$140.00 per group of up to ten students.

If your group has fewer than 10 students the group rate applies. A group is capped at 12 students unless permission is granted by coordinator

Each additional student over 10 in a group pays an additional \$14 per student. Teachers & 2 chaperones per group required, at no cost.

Cancellations within 48 hours of the event & no show groups will be charged. Rain or Shine.

Workshop Descriptions, Spring Field Days 2025

Sheepmania - Learn about the time period when there were more sheep than people in Vermont and see our sheep get their annual wool cut, try your hand at wool processing by washing, carding and preparing the fibers for a project.

Blacksmith - Participants will see a demonstration with a master Blacksmith at the Henderson Forge. Courtney, our blacksmith creates objects primarily from wrought iron by forging the metal using tools to hammer, bend and cut to create farm tools and decorative pieces.

Museum Tour - Learn the history of Brownington and Orleans County, including the story of Alexander Lucius Twilight. Learn local heritage, 19th century history, art or other topics related to the history of Orleans County and the Northeast Kingdom.

Pond Studies - Behind the Lawrence Barn there is a pond that is teaming with micro-invertebrates. These are animals (often Larva) without a backbone. The populations can be indicators of water quality and many other biologic factors. We will be pond dipping, observing, identifying while participating in some real hands-on science!

Geology - Come and see our long time Buildings and Grounds volunteer Peter Martin disclose the mysteries of Igneous, Sedimentary and Metamorphic rocks with his extensive rock collection. Participants will get to view and do some hands-on geologic experiments. Maybe learn a bit about the grounds and natural history of the village with Peter's naturalist tales.

Stones to Bones - Led by volunteer Joan Alexander, a not so spooky, daytime cemetery wander about for students. Explore the many gifts old gravestones have to offer - sculpture, stones, symbolic artwork, history, poetry and stories. Often these old gravestones are covered with lichen, moss, dirt and algae that hide the inscriptions and artwork, as well as deteriorate the stone itself.

Woodworking - Join master woodworker Dan Chasse as he demonstrates the use of numerous hand tools and completes a project before your eyes. There will be some hands-on opportunities for your students as well.

Farm Chores Relay - In this fun, active, hands-on workshop, groups will compete with one another in a friendly way while learning about various chores around a 19th century farm - hay bale and wood stacking, water hauling, butter churning, feeding chickens and more!
